#### Brothers team up to help fund project

John Meloy and his younger brother, Bob, have a long history of helping others.

John is a retired Presbyterian minister who served the church for 42 years. Bob spent his career working for the YMCA as a dorm manager in major cities like New York and Honolulu.

Today, the brothers are continuing their tradition of giving back by helping their fellow residents at Swan Creek Retirement Village in Toledo.

John has been a donor for more than a decade, supporting the Life Care Commitment and capital projects like the campus's wellness center, which bears his name as a symbol of his generosity.

Most recently, John teamed up with his brother to help fund a renovation of Swan Creek's Memory Enhancement Center.

This special care unit offers a comfortable and safe environment for Swan Creek residents who are living with dementia and other memory-related illnesses.

The renovation focused on upgrades to the overall look of the space and included new wallpaper, paint, window treatments, flooring, lighting, furniture, artwork and other décor. Some resident rooms have been refreshed, there's a new arched entry to the space, and a public restroom was also remodeled.

Perhaps the most exciting change to the space is the planned addition of a sensory room in place of the old nurses' station.

With soothing lights and wall art that projects calming scenes, this dedicated space will provide a quiet, moodenhancing space where residents can relax.

This renovation project was of particular interest to John as his late wife, Elizabeth "Betty" Kridler Meloy, lived in the special care unit for a time.

John said that he was glad Betty could get the care she needed while still living at Swan Creek because it allowed them to continue spending quality time together. "We could still have dinner together every night," John shared.

It was his personal experience with the Memory Enhancement Center that made John want to help make the space better for current residents. "It made me feel like this was a very worthy project," he said.

Thanks in part to their generosity, guests can


enjoy spacious private suites and semi-private rooms that include amenities like in-room showers, flat-screen TVs, power-lift recliners and window views.

### Daughter donates funds for special garden

Mary Ann Jacobs was so impressed by the care given to her father and mother at **Llanfair Retirement Community** in Cincinnati that she donated funds to create a special meditation garden in memory of her parents and to thank the Llanfair staff.

Mary Ann recalled how her father used to enjoy visiting an outdoor courtyard that was near his room at Llanfair.

"I would take the radio out and he would listen to the Reds," she said. "It was nice to have a place to go outside of his room. Even some of the other residents' families would come out to sit and talk." After her parents passed away, Mary Ann decided to make a charitable gift to transform another courtyard on the campus into a special garden that would honor not only her parents but also the staff members who had cared for them.

Mary Ann shared that even when her father had completely lost his ability to speak, he would still "light up like a Christmas tree" when the nurses or other staff came into his room.

"God brings a lot of angels, and he left quite a few of them at Llanfair," Mary Ann said of the Llanfair staff. "I will always be grateful for the wonderful care they gave to both my mom and dad."

This appreciation will be reflected on a plaque in the garden. It will read: "The Art and Jane Jacobs Meditation Garden, dedicated with gratitude to all Llanfair employees by Mary Ann Jacobs."

Residents and staff alike will be able to enjoy the space, as it sits outside of the living center and can be seen from the dining rooms and some resident rooms.

The garden features an array of shrubs, perennials and ornamental grasses, as well as a wooden arbor, wheelchair-accessible paths and a water feature.

It's exactly the kind of calm and quiet space Mary Ann was hoping for when she made the gift.

Rev. Kathy Barlow Westmoreland, pastor of the Jacobs' home church, remembered Mary Ann's father and mother with affection and admiration.

"While both of them were at Llanfair, they really enjoyed visiting outdoors with their family and friends," she said. "So this garden space will be wonderful for that, and a fitting tribute to them both."

Others feel the space is also a fitting tribute to Mary Ann and the generosity she's shown the campus over the years as a donor, volunteer and board member. Llanfair Executive Director Sheena Parton said of Mary Ann's giving nature, "this gift just tops it off."

Gift Planning Director Judi Pohlmeyer agreed. She commented that Mary Ann "has been and will continue to be a very good friend to Llanfair," adding that her most recent contribution was "a wonderful, generous and amazing gift."

#### Residents help fund golf cart to expedite hospice trips

With help from charitable gifts, a golf cart has been purchased to provide the nurse with more rapid transportation around the 110-acre campus.

The request came from Cheryl Withrow, regional executive director of Senior Independence's Southwest Ohio and Miami Valley regions.

"Our nurse was walking across the campus or using her own car and trying to find parking," Cheryl explained.

As Gift Planning Director Whitney O'Neal pointed out, "It's more efficient to jump on a golf cart and go, versus having to get in a car, drive to the destination and find a parking spot."

Whitney says she knew she could find donor support

for the project since so many people have been touched by hospice.

Whitney shared the idea with Mount Pleasant residents Robert Boonstra, James and Viola Bruner, and Kenneth Shinn. "They were more than happy to help fund the cart and help their fellow residents," Whitney said.
